JEW, BLACKS SEE UNITY THROUGH KING

Citing Martin Luther King Jr.'s disdain for anti-Semitism, a group of Jewish and black religious leaders yesterday evening used the occasion of the civil rights leader's birthday to build a bond between African-Americans and Jews.

"In the words of Dr. King, we shall overcome," said Benjamin K. Patterson of the First Presbyterian Russell Sage Memorial Church of Far Rockaway before the ceremony at Temple Israel in Lawrence.

"Collectively," he added after a pause.

An audience of about 250 Jews and African-Americans applauded, called out their agreement, and sang together. Four black churches, four Jewish organizations and 20 synagogues, including Conservative, Reform, Orthodox, and Reconstructionist congregations, participated in the event.

"Everything (King) sought to bring about was to be brought about by nonviolent means," said Rabbi Paul Joseph of Temple Emmanuel of Lynbrook.

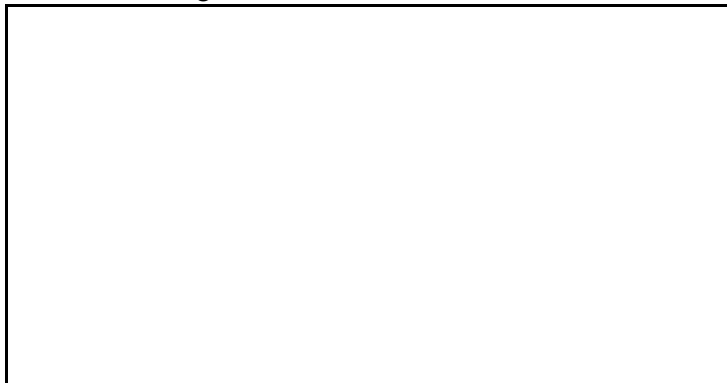
Joseph noted that King opposed the war in Vietnam and suggested the civil rights leader might have similarly protested a war in Iraq.

"I think that's something our nation as a whole has to take into consideration," Joseph said.

Jay H. Rosenbaum, Temple Israel's rabbi, said King's message can be a source of spiritual comfort for people of all races and religions. "It is especially important in these times that (King's) message resonates in the hearts and souls of our congregations," he said.

Still, Rev. Victor Hall, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in Jamaica, cautioned against complacency in the struggle for racial equality. "Be not deceived by the illusion of progress," he told the audience. "there are more African-American men in prison than in college."

When all speeches were finished and King's famous "I Have a Dream" speech had been read, the audience rose to its feet and sang the song that most defines King's movement, "We Shall Overcome."

B'RUCHIM HABIM, WELCOME AND SHALOM! It is indeed an honor for "me and my Temple Israel family" to host this evening's Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. commemoration program. We have gathered here this evening, from synagogues throughout our community and across Long Island; orthodox, conservative, reform and reconstructionist Jews, the largest coalition of Jewish organizations and synagogues in America to make the statement that the lessons and legacy of Dr. King's life must resonate in our lives, and the life of our nation, so that 21st century America will be a better place, a place of fulfilled dreams for all Americans. It is also a great pleasure to welcome our Christian and African American brothers and sisters from the Calvary Baptist Church, their Pastor Reverend Victor Hall, the members of the First Presbyterian Russell Sage Memorial Church and their spiritual leader, Dr. Benjamin Patterson, and the members of the Woodmere/Lawrence United Methodist Church, and their Pastor Reverend Henry and to welcome all who gathered here this evening. Collectively we make the profound statement, that what happens to one person of faith "anywhere" affects all people of faith "everywhere".

When I assumed the pulpit of Temple Israel six months ago, both paraphrasing and quoting the prophets I stated, "my house shall be a house of assembly for all peoples". The cause of Jewish unity, a sanctuary where all of God's children feel welcomed, wanted and the warm embrace of peoplehood and faith has been and remains the platform of my rabbinate, and the foundation stones upon which this temple was built 95 years ago. Our guest speakers for this evening are internationally renowned religious leaders, who I am privileged to work with in helping to shape the worlds of interfaith and intrafaith relations. This evening once again our pulpit is graced by Reverend Victor Hall. The community had the pleasure of being treated to Reverend Hall's "oratory splendor" at my installation a few months ago, and my dear friend shared in the simcha of Jordan and Michelle's wedding two weeks ago in this magnificent sanctuary. Reverend Hall hails from Texas, is a national religious figure and one of the preeminent Baptist preachers in America. Reverend Hall and I came together at the suggestion of Dr. Martin Luther King III and Reverend Jesse Jackson; they are widely respected and admired for their work in civil rights and human rights.

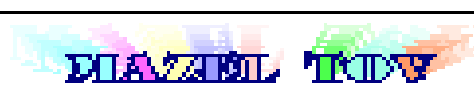

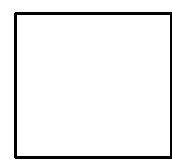

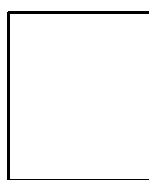

Rabbi Rosenbaum will be returning to the pulpit that evening after leading a rabbinic mission to Stockholm. The Rabbi will be joined by fifty of his colleagues, Edgar Bronfman, President of World Jewish Congress and Dr. Israel Singer, chairman of the World Jewish Congress and President of the Claims Conference, to bring the support of the North American Jewish Community to Sweden Jewry, in light of the increase of anti-Semitism in Europe and petition Sweden's government against implementing legislation to prohibit Jewish ritual.

When the unspeakable occurred on September 11, 2001 Reverend Hall brought his power, prestige and pastoral skills to the Queens Jewish community and joined with me on my pulpit for the Queens wide interfaith memorial service, which was held on the evening of September 11. We have worked together to bring our two communities closer together and strengthen the bonds of love, respect, appreciation and cooperation between African Americans and Jews.

Rabbi Marc Schneier is President of the North American Boards of Rabbis, which I serve as director and helped co found with my dear colleague. *The Forward*, in its annual survey of Jewish leaders, named Rabbi Schneier as one of the 50 most prominent Jews in the United States. Rabbi Schneier has been honored by the United States Congress and the State of Israel as an advocate for human rights, religious and ethnic tolerance.

As President of the Foundation for Ethnic Understanding, Rabbi Schneier has proven that dialogue between ethnic and religious communities is the most effective path towards the reduction of bigotry and the promotion of reconciliation and understanding.

Rabbi Schneier serves as Chairman of the World Jewish Congress Commission on Intergroup Relations. He is the President of the New York Board of Rabbis, and is the founding rabbi of the Hampton Synagogue, in Westhampton Beach, New York.

In January 2000 Rabbi Schneier's book SHARED DREAMS was published, documenting Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s relationship with the Jewish Community.

Marc Schneier is an internationally renowned Rabbinic personality, his counsel was sought by Rabbis and world leaders alike. But most important of all, Rabbi Schneier is a dear, beloved, and loyal friend. The bonds between us forged in the crucible of social action and social justice for all of Gods children.

My personal thanks to Dr. William Groisser, Temple Israel's Social Action chairperson; to Mr. Norman Steen for his yeomen's job in handling the advertising and publicity for this evening. And to Joel Gerstel, the officers, board of trustees and membership of Temple Israel for their financial and personal support of this evening's program.

We have come together this evening to celebrate our heritage as proud Americans and the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., and that all people live together in peace and harmony, a message never more important than at this moment in history. It is the message of the Prophets.

We have come together this evening as an answer to sacrilege of a Trent Lott and his lot. Our vision of America is that of a beautiful multicolored tapestry with different hues and shades of color, creed, religion and ethnicity; where we celebrate and find unity in our diversity.

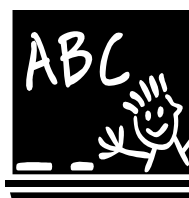

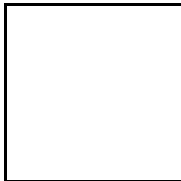

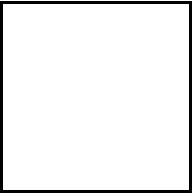

**RABBI ZION'S REMARKS AT
DR. KING'S OBSERVANCE**

When we gathered for the bus trip to Washington that sweltering summer day, little did we realize that we were a part of history. And when Martin Luther King Jr., addressed us in the nations capital, and spoke of ascending the mountain, I sensed that Mt. Sinai was the mountain that we had symbolically climbed with King. At that moment, the phrase of the American poet James Russell Lowell, resounded in my soul. The poet wrote, "men whose boast it is you come of fathers brave and free, if their breathe on earth a slave are you truly free and brave? If you do not feel the chain when it wracks another's pain, are you not base slaves indeed, slaves unworthy to be freed?"

Having ascended the mountain, Kings words sounded especially mosaic when he spoke of the relationship between law and love. Love is a passion that may change with time, but law is permanent. King said, "law may not change the heart, but it will restrain the heartless". On the trip to Washington, I recognized that history was on the move, and we were a part of it.



THOUGHTS TO PONDER

Rabbi Joel Y. Zion

WHAT ARE ISRAEL'S MOST PRESSING PROBLEMS?

1. Terrorism: With Hamas and other extremists groups threatening to continue their terror campaign even if Israel and the Palestinian authority can reach an agreement.
2. The American attack against Iraq, which looms as a genuine possibility, will likely result in Iraqi retaliation against Israel.
3. Palestine: The demand for an autonomous Arab State of Palestine as set forth by the authority.
4. The government: the domestic political pot is boiling and despite external efforts it's likely that Sharon's unity coalition will disintegrate, possibly on the issue of the national budget.
5. Inflation: Israel's economy faces not only domestic, political and security problems, but also an unsettled world economy.
6. Unemployment: directly related to the above is a steady rise of unemployment.
7. World opinion: in this area, the situation appears to have worsened since last year when acts of anti-Semitism and anti-Israel attitudes by major nations serves to isolate the country on the international scene.
8. Water: problem is a creation of nature that human efforts have long been neglected. Plants now under construction will not be operational during the coming year nor will water imported from Turkey be arriving.
9. Road accidents: the number of fatalities on the road each year exceed by five the number of victims of terrorism.
10. Israel's Arabs: while the majority of Israel's Arabs and their spokesmen continue to express their loyalty to Israel as citizens of the state, an increasing number have collaborated actively or passively with terrorism.
11. The Lebanese border: the relative quiet has been disturbed by occasional hostile activities by the Hezbollah and by obvious arm strengthening of that body with Syrian backing. Israel's defenses are in a state of constant alert.

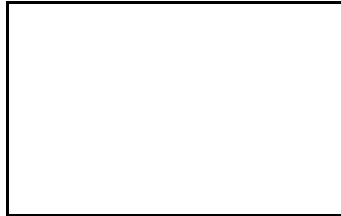
