Rabbi Jay H. Rosenbaum

The following is an excerpt from the eulogy delivered by Rabbi Rosenbaum at the memorial tribute to Cantor David Benedict, April 23

We have come together today in love and in respect to mourn the passing of our beloved Cantor Emeritus David Benedict. David Benedict – our David, served the Jewish people in the tradition of the David we find in the Book of Psalms, for indeed he was a composer and musician extraordinaire, and a sweet singer of Israel.

Some quarter of a century ago, I was blessed to participate, by my reckoning in 365 services on this pulpit with Rabbi Zion and Cantor Benedict. I marveled each and every time at the majesty, magic and magnificent tones of oratory and melody flawlessly executed with precision, that they created, filling the sanctuary with the power of the Holy. One does not judge a religious service by the same standards as an opera or Broadway show, for what we do here is not a play, nor are the Rabbi or the Cantor actors. Yet, as Assistant Rabbi of this congregation, what I was privileged to share in, on a purely artistic plain, rivaled any work by a Richard Burton, Sir Laurence Olivier, Jan Peerce, Moshe Kusevitsky, Richard Tucker and Robert Merrill. And Cantor Benedict's, Avenu Malkanu, I am sure would have invoked awe and praise from tenors the likes of Domingo, Carreras and Mario Lanza.

One of the greatest compliments I remember receiving back then, from one of our congregants was, "Jay you fit in so well on this pulpit".

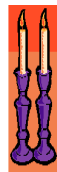
David Benedict was truly a renaissance man, a great talent and intellect, a complex personality who understood the human condition as a symphony that it is played out throughout all the movements we call the life cycle, from the beginning of life to the dawn of life everlasting.

For half a century, Cantor Benedict shared his life and made his journey with our Temple Israel family. We loved him and he loved us. I hoped that we would have been able to honor him for his 50 years of service in life rather than in death. Yet, honor him, we do this morning, for both his memory and his life and his legacy to us and Am Yisrael, which is immortal.

So many in our congregation and community were comforted and consoled by David Benedict when tragedy and loss cast its shadow over their homes and hearts. The joy he brought to bride and bridegroom under the chupah as he intoned Shiva Brachot – the seven wedding benedictions, was a testimony to the man, his art and his calling.

I believe in my heart of hearts that in addition to the early training David received in music, beginning his formal training in piano at age 5, his experiences and that which he witnessed as a first lieutenant during the second World War, seeing the horrors, brutality and grotesque consequences of battle, helped to shape his life's work which brought beauty and pleasure into the world. Having served as an army chaplain of a medical brigade, I was able to connect, and more than connect, visualize and internalize the war stories David shared with me.

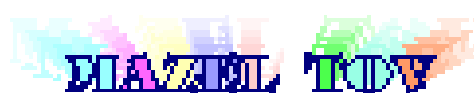

But it was too late. The baby was dead and the farmer turned to his wife and pointing to their friends said, "If we had only joined hands before."

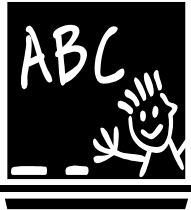
Temple Israel, which we have inherited, this magnificent jewel in the crown of Reform Judaism is our beloved child. It represents the finest, most democratic, and liberal form of our ancient faith. To those who suggest that we are lost in the fields of history we say: We will continue to join hands under talented lay leadership, in support of our new Rabbi, Cantor and Educator. With the empowerment of God and nature, we will together plow the field and enjoy the fruits of our faith.

He crossed the Atlantic 20 times with the troops to engage the Nazi monsters. David found himself in the midst of thunderous sea battles and naval bombardments, having to take to the lifeboats cast into the waves of the raging sea, yet throughout all, he kept before him his responsibility for the wounded that were in his charge, as he administered the ship's hospital aboard the Rushville.

Both young and old were naturally drawn to Cantor Benedict for he was charming, charismatic and engaging. I witnessed first hand how he would set at ease nervous, Bar/Bat Mitzvah students. With a smile that could light up a room, he would turn to a youngster who he knew was having some difficulty with his Torah portion and ask, "how's the Chinese going", which was David's way of saying to the child, "I feel your pain".

Perhaps it is more than coincidence that David passed away on April 15, the day before Passover. Like so many "klay kodesh" – holy vessels that serve B'nai Yisrael beginning in Egypt, he heard and understood the cries, the angst, the needs of the Jewish people, his people, his Congregation, you and I.

Cantor Benedict had "a long and remarkable life" a distinguished career through which he attained nothing less than immortality. He set the standard of excellence in cantorial music for our congregation and the cantorate. He was a personality of note, of the stage, the silver screen and the mass media. Most important of all, he was a man that we loved, respected and admired. Cantor David Benedict was a man with a mission and of great courage, an "eved avday hashem", one who served those who served the Lord. As his reward he was blessed, in that he lived life to the last moment of life, serving his people till he was called by the Master of the Universe to enter his choir of angels. Like Moses, when David died, "his eye was not dim nor his natural force abated".

This past Saturday, joining with our high school students and their guests from Berlin, I viewed the Matisse a Picasso exhibit at Moma. Marveling at the magnificent art, many of the works dealing with the theme of music, including the self portrait of Matisse, I thought of David Benedict who created his own masterpiece works, as composer, performer, professor and cantor. Then before exiting the exhibit, I came across these words, penned by Matisse capturing his relationship with Picasso; "We must talk to each other as much as we can. When one of us dies there will be somethings that the other will never be able to talk of with anyone else".

Cantor Benedict, Rabbi Zion, Temple Israel of Lawrence, ours, was, and remains a unique dialogue, for we spoke not only with the words of our mouths but also through the understanding of our hearts, one soul to another.

"T'hay nishmato t'zor bztor hachim – may the soul of Chazzan David Benedict be bound up in the bond of eternal life, Amen!

FROM KNOCKWURST TO MATZOH BREI

TEMPLE ISRAEL OF LAWRENCE HOSTS 12 GERMAN HIGH SCHOOL EXCHANGE STUDENTS FOR PESACH

On Thursday evening April 10, twelve high school students from Berlin arrived at Kennedy Airport for a religious and cultural international exchange program with high school students from the 5 Towns. The purpose of the program was to foster better understanding, respect and appreciation between young people from two mighty nations who will be responsible for shaping the world of the 21st century.

Temple Israel of Lawrence, was the host congregation for this joint venture between the North American Boards of Rabbis and Germany's Foreign Ministry and the Ministry of Education. Families from the congregation and the 5 Towns, hosted the exchange students in their homes, embracing them as if they were their own children. Arriving during the holiday of Pesach, the German students (with one of the students of Vietnamese descent and another the daughter of a Palestinian father) had the unique experience of participating in Passover Seders. They joined approximately 100 congregants at a dinner hosted by, The Woodro Delicatessen preceding Shabbat services on Friday evening, April 11. Each student at that time introduced themselves to the congregation and community. In addition, the students visited New York City Hall, where they met Mayor Michael Bloomberg, participated in discussions with the students in Temple Israel's high school program, visited Ground Zero and the Museum of Jewish Heritage-New York's Holocaust Museum. Following an outing to Shea Stadium where they saw the Mets play the Diamond Backs, they joined together for a farewell dinner at La Viola Restaurant in Cedarhurst, compliments of the Viola Family.

During their eighteen day odyssey the participants dined on an eclectic menu from matzoh brei, choroset and gefilte fish to pasta, pizza and that all American favorite, the hot dog.

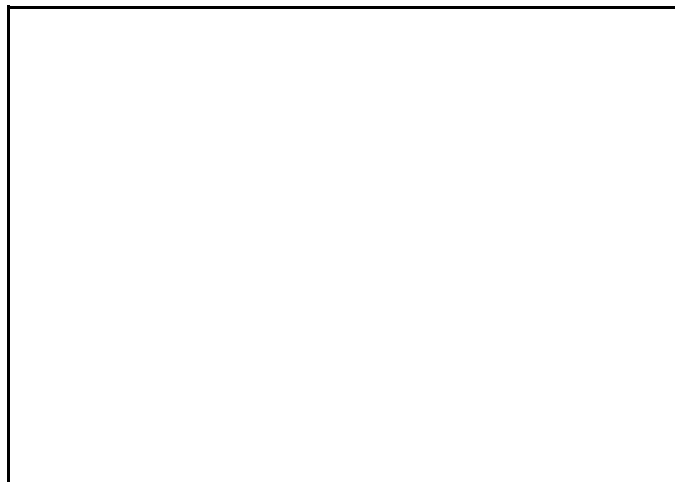
The program was truly a life experience for all. The students in the 5 Towns look forward to traveling to Berlin in August for a two-week stay with their new German friends.
